Thereafter, unless otherwise indicated, you should keep about 15 *FKC* pages ahead of our classroom discussion. You will need to make continual cross-reference to the *Rules Pamphlet*. Whenever there is a reference in class or in your readings to a provision in these materials you will be expected to refer to and read that provision.

Coverage: During the Spring Semester we will cover Parts Three and Four in *FKC* (pp. 395-803). Selected portions of these sections will not be treated in class or will be handled in summary fashion. You will nevertheless be responsible for all the above-listed material.

Examinations and Grading: At the end of the semester, there will be an examination around 3 hours long. The examination will produce a final grade for the term subject to adjustments for class participation. The examination grades may be adjusted somewhat up or down to yield final semester grades that take account of attendance and performance in class. The examination will be modified open-book, which means you may bring into the examination room only *FKC*, your *Rules Pamphlet*, any xeroxed materials handed out in connection with this course, your class notes and any other materials substantially of your own preparation. Since reference to these specified materials may be made on the examinations, you will be expected to bring them with you into the examination room. You will not be permitted to use lawbooks, treatises, commercial outlines, articles or notes prepared by others.

Employment Law-Hyde

I will prepare a complete syllabus during the first week of the term. In recent years,

I have taught the chapters on termination of employment, rights to speech and political participation, post-termination issues (trade secrets, covenants not to compete, invention assignments), employment discrimination, pensions, and processes of securing employment rights (litigation, administration, or arbitration). If many students have already taken the course on employment discrimination or would simply prefer another topic, I would be happy to substitute some of the chapters I never get to, such as health and safety or health insurance. So you might want to flip around the book to see what interests you.

For the first class, we will focus on the graphic in the introductory chapter that displays an economic model of an implicit contract for lifetime employment. Make sure you understand the graphic. Then think about employment relations for which it is a good representation, and, also, who it leaves out.

If the parties agree that Mr. Big will buy the Mall in an "as is" condition, how successfully may Mr. Big later argue misrepresentation if the owner fails to disclose the existence of asbestos in the premises?

Under what circumstances would you recommend to Mr. Big that he dispense with all of the foregoing, save some legal fees, and simply buy the property without any letter of intent, term sheet, or purchase agreement after performing whatever due diligence he thought appropriate?
