Spring 2007

- **JD Students Only - S/U Grading Option Verification Form.** Classes of 2007 and 2008. Students must return their Grading Option Verification form for Spring 2007 course enrollment to the Law School Registrar's Office no later than **4:00 p.m. Tuesday, February 13, 2007.**
- **University Registration** is complete once tuition and other financial obligations have been met. Tuition statements and payment information were sent by the Office of the University Bursar in December. **Please** give special attention to the dates regarding tuition payment and finance charges. In addition to finance charges, **a \$350 late fee will be assessed beginning February 9, 2007.**
- **Registration Status** - Students will determine their own registration status by signing on to **Just the Facts through UPortal. Just the Facts** will direct you to the appropriate office if your registration is incomplete. You will need your NetID to check your registration status.
- **Bursar's Office** - If **Just the Facts** indicates your registration is on hold for financial reasons, you must first stop by the Bursar's Office, 260 Day Hall to clear your student account by **February 9, 2007** and then proceed to the office of the University Registrar, B7 Day Hall.
- **Release of information** - A reminder to all students: students asking faculty members to write recommendations will need to complete a release form with the Law School Registrar's Office if a faculty member wishes to view the student's record. You may complete and submit the release form on-line at: <https://support.law.cornell.edu/students> using the on-line Cornell Law School Permission to Examine Student Record form at the Academic Matters link or in person at the Law School Registrar's Office.

- **Attendance** - Regular attendance is required to sit for examinations, to receive a degree, and for certification to appropriate bar examiners. Irregular attendance or neglect of work may result in a student's being barred from taking an examination or being removed from the school.
- **Absences** - A student who must be absent from class for a period of three or more days should contact Associate Dean for Student Affairs Anne Lukingbeal and discuss the reasons for the absence.
- **Summer School Study** - Students may petition the faculty for permission to take courses in law summer school programs of ABA-approved law schools and, upon their successful completion, to receive credit toward the Cornell J.D. degree. Such petitions are considered on an individual basis, and in no case is credit in excess of six hours granted for all such summer school law study. For timely consideration of the petition, interested students should submit their petitions to the Law School Registrar's Office (addressed to Dean Lukingbeal) **prior to April 1**. - **Registration with Bar Authorities**
Deadlines for bar examination applications may be approaching. The rules of certain states (not New York) require either notifying the bar admission authorities of intent to begin the study of law or registering with the authorities when law studies begin. Students should obtain instructions from the proper source (usually the state board of bar examiners or the clerk of the court of highest jurisdiction) in the state in which they intend to practice. Failure to comply with the instructions may substantially delay admission to the bar. For current bar requirements, applicants should consult the *Official American Bar Association Guide to Approved Law Schools*, published annually by the American Bar Association. This book is on reserve in the Law School library.
- **Bar Applications Requiring Fingerprinting** (not all bar applications require fingerprints)
Fingerprinting is available on campus at the Public Safety Office, G2 Barton Hall, 24-hours a day and at the Ithaca Police Department on 120 E. Clinton Street, Ithaca. You will need to take the fingerprint card from your bar application packet with you, and two forms of picture ID. The Ithaca Police Department is only available to process the cards on Wednesdays from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and charges a \$10.00 fee. Their number is (607) 272-9973.
- **Multistate Professional Responsibility Examination (MPRE)**
The MPRE is administered three times per year and is required as partial fulfillment of the requirements for admission to practice law in most jurisdictions. Other jurisdictions may begin requiring the MPRE during 2007. Check with the Board of Bar Examiners in the state in which you plan to seek admissions to the bar for updated information on MPRE requirements. Passing scores, which are established by each jurisdiction, are subject to change. Applications are available in the Law School Registrar's Office or Web Registration at www.ncbex.org or www.act.org/mpre.

Online registration must be **received before 12:00 Midnight Central Time on the published deadline date**. Paper applications must be received in the MPRE Application Department in Iowa City, by 5:00 p.m. Central Time on the published deadline date. (Applicants needing accommodations due to a disability must apply by mail. See section on Testing of Applicants with Disabilities in the MPRE Information Booklet.)

The Multistate Professional Responsibility Examination is two hours and five minutes in length. Applicants for the March and November exams must report to their assigned test center no later than 9:00 a.m., and for the August exam by 12:30 p.m.

The March test date is on a Saturday morning. If your religious beliefs preclude you from taking the March examination on Saturday, you may apply to take the MPRE on Sunday, March 11. Requests to take the exam on Sunday must be in writing and must include a letter from your cleric confirming your affiliation with a recognized religious entity that observes its Sabbath throughout the year on Saturday. This documentation must be received by the late receipt deadline and must be sent with a copy of the online confirmation received after submission of an online application or with a completed paper application. The applicant will be notified whether or not the request is granted.

The MPRE is based on the law governing the conduct of lawyers, including the disciplinary rules of professional conduct currently articulated in the ABA Model Rules of Professional Conduct and the ABA Code of Judicial Conduct, and controlling constitutional decisions and generally accepted principles established in leading federal and state cases and in procedural and evidentiary rules.

- **Summer Faculty Research Assistant Opportunities**

Students seeking paid summer positions working with Law faculty should leave a resume, cover letter, and transcript with me by **Friday, February 9, 2007**. To assist you in the process, the Registrar's Office will provide an unofficial transcript at your request. Resumes, cover letters and transcripts will be distributed to interested faculty.

This service is informal and students should not assume that faculty members will necessarily take advantage of it. Therefore, students should feel free to also contact faculty about summer opportunities.

- **Multicultural Work Environments I & II**

2008 and 2009 JD Students with F1 Visas. The law faculty offers a course in the Law School available to students with F1 Visas who seek curricular practical training this summer: **Multicultural Work Environments I & II**.

Eligibility & Procedures: The course is open only to those students who will be working during the summer in a country other than that of their citizenship. Course II is open only to those students who have completed course I. Each is a one (1)-credit, S/U course and may be taken as an elective in addition to the required degree credits. The course grade will appear on the student's transcript.

Objective & Assignment: The goal of this course is to promote an understanding of the challenges encountered in the work environment as a result of cultural differences. To that end, students are required to complete a ten-page paper by September 15 following their summer internship.

Registration occurs in the spring, with a grade posted in the fall after the requirements are satisfied. **Registration is online** at: <http://www.isso.cornell.edu/immigration/fl/law673.php> **beginning February 1, 2007 and ending June 1, 2007**. Prior to registering for the course, students must obtain a summer internship offer. The internship may be in an organization which previously employed the

student, but the position and work assignments should not substantially duplicate earlier work for the organization. Once that has been done, registration can be done online.

After you register online for the course, you will receive an approval email from Sarah Hilsman at the International Students & Scholars Office (ISSO). The email will explain that you need to bring a copy of that email along with your job offer letter to the ISSO (B50 Caldwell Hall) in order to obtain your work authorization. You must notify the Law School Registrar if you change or drop the internship after registration. The internship may not be extended beyond the summer, and you may not drop the course after performing the internship without invalidating your work authorization. Cornell Advocates for Human Rights and The Clarke Middle-East Speaker Series present, Dean Harold Koh, Yale Law School speaking on "The United States and Human Rights: Five Years After."

Harold Hongju Koh is the Dean and Gerard C. and Bernice Latrobe Smith Professor of International Law at Yale Law School. From 1998 to 2001, he served as Assistant Secretary of State for Democracy, Human Rights and Labor. A graduate of Harvard College, Oxford University and Harvard Law School, he went on to serve as law clerk to Judge Malcolm Richard Wilkey of the D.C. Circuit, and Justice Harry A. Blackmun of the U.S. Supreme Court. Before going to Yale in 1985, he practiced law at Covington and Burling and at the Office of Legal Counsel at the Department of Justice.

Dean Koh has written more than 80 articles and authored or co-authored eight books, including *Transnational Legal Problems* (with H. Steiner & D. Vagts) and *The National Security Constitution*, which won the American Political Science Association's award as the best book on the American Presidency. Dean Koh has been awarded nine honorary doctorates and two law school medals and has received more than twenty-five awards for his human rights work. He is a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, an Honorary Fellow of Magdalen College, Oxford, a Visiting Fellow at All Souls College, Oxford, and a member of the American Law Institute. He has served as an Editor of the American Journal of International Law and the Foundation Press Casebook Series. He has received Guggenheim and Century Foundation Fellowships and he sits on the boards of directors or overseers of Harvard University, the Brookings Institution, National Democratic Institute, Human Rights First, and Human Rights in China. He has been named by American Lawyer magazine as one of America's 45 leading public sector lawyers under the age of 45, and by A Magazine as one of the 100 most influential Asian-Americans of the 1990s. He received the 2005 Louis B. Sohn Award from the American Bar Association and the 2003 Wolfgang Friedmann Award from Columbia Law School for his lifetime achievements in International Law.

Grace Kuo, National Chung-Cheng University Department of Law will present: *When Local Family Law Meets Global Trend: An Ethnographic Study of Foreign Spouses and the Intimate Citizenship Regulations in Taiwan*. **A lunch will be served.**

The increasing number of marriage immigrants, as one of the transnational migration phenomena, has made profound impacts both on the delivering and the receiving countries. For the receiving countries, politics within marriage and family has been challenged by the arrival of foreign spouses. When family law, its discourse and practice, is considered as a solid moral standard on which to construct kinship, marriage and family for the state, how does the intimate citizenship of foreign spouses facilitate interdisciplinary family law research, which involves a critical assessment of the *law* itself? How do transnational and global factors influence the protocols, the procedures, and the interpretations of both family law and the related regulations concerning foreign spouses? Based on an ethnographic study of a Vietnamese bride and her family in southern Taiwan, this study discusses the ideology of state control over the private sphere, including marriage, family, etc., through exposing the symbolization of family law.
