**Spring 2008**

- **To the Classes of 2009 & 2010 - Pre-Registration for Fall 2008 Law School courses** will occur over the summer recess. Students will be notified by email (to their Cornell NetID email address) of registration dates.
- **New University Student Records System** - The University is implementing a new student administration system (PeopleSoft) in mid-March. Law students will continue to interface with University services by using the new Just The Facts/Student Center. Please read carefully all communications you receive from the Office of the University Registrar. As you use the new system, please share your experiences with us. - **Fall 2008 Courses in Divisions Other than the Law School** - Students interested in enrolling in courses in other divisions of the University for the Fall 2008 semester may pre-enroll using the University CoursEnroll process. Law students will use the University system to select their non-law courses. The pre-registration period for law students to select non-law courses is tentatively scheduled for April 2-18.

- **Please Note: Pre-enrollment does not guarantee enrollment in the course.** Students enrolling in non-law courses for JD credit will also need to complete the required petition with the Law School Registrar's office, at the Registrar's website (<https://support.law.cornell.edu/students>), Course Registration link, *Request for Credit for Outside Course*. A student electing a course outside the Law School for credit or otherwise, must also register for at least 9 credit hours in the Law School each term. Regardless of the number of courses elected outside the Law School, a student must earn 72 semester credit hours in professional law subjects. This applies to all law students, including those in joint degree programs.

- **Spring 08 Final Examinations** - Students who have **exam conflicts** are reminded to notify the Law School Registrar's Office, in writing, using the online Deferral Request link at the Registrar's website: <https://support.law.cornell.edu/students> by **Wednesday, April 9, 2008**, of the conflict, and should note which exam they wish rescheduled. - **Exams and dictionaries - JD students** whose native or working language is not normally English may request the use of a non-legal dictionary for examinations by submitting a written request to the Dean of Students by **Wednesday, April 9, 2008**. **If you received permission to use a non-legal dictionary for the fall exam period, you do not need to make another request for the spring exam period.** The non-legal dictionary must be supplied by the student and the dictionary may be in print or electronic format; provided, however, that any electronic dictionary must be a stand-alone dictionary with a set memory (e.g., a dictionary program that is loaded on a laptop computer does not qualify). All electronic dictionaries must be approved by the Registrar well in advance of the examinations. **LL.M. students** with questions regarding the use of a non-legal dictionary for examinations should contact **Assistant Dean Charles Cramton**.

- **Laptops and exams** - You will be receiving detailed information for Windows and Macintosh computers in preparation for using your laptop for spring examinations during the week of March 31.

### **Reminders To All Graduating Students**

On-line applications and instructions for submitting the New York State Bar application will be available **April 1-April 30, 2008** at: <http://www.nybarexam.org>. Please print the Specimen of Applicants Handwriting form and bring it to one of the handwriting sessions.

Those who are unable to attend either session should stop by the Registrar's Office to make an appointment to complete the handwriting specimen. Applications for the New York State Bar for the July 2008 Exam **must be postmarked between April 1-April 30, 2008**.

- **Certificates of Attendance/Graduation.** A certificate of law school attendance/graduation is required by most state bar authorities. Some states require that the certificate be made on a form they provide, and others require it on Law School letterhead. Certificates are completed and mailed directly from the Law School Registrars Office. **Certificates of graduation will be sent after May 25, 2008.**

- **Official Transcripts.** Please remember that they are not processed at Cornell Law School. Students can request an official transcript (**including Spring 08 grades**) in **May** at the University Registrar's Office, B7 Day Hall. The request should include the following information: **Hold for Grades and Degree - Graduating Law** and where you want it sent.

- **Applications Requiring Fingerprinting (not all bar applications require fingerprinting)**  
Fingerprinting is available on-campus at the Public Safety Office, G2 Barton Hall, 24-hours a day and at the Ithaca Police Department, 120 E. Clinton St., Ithaca. You will need to take the fingerprint card from your bar application packet with you, and **two** forms of picture ID. The Ithaca Police Department is only available to process the cards on Wednesdays from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and charges a \$10.00 fee. Their number is (607) 272-9973.
