Please Note: Pre-enrollment does not guarantee enrollment in the course. Students enrolling in non-law courses for JD credit will also need to complete the required petition with the Law School Registrar's office, at the Registrars website (<https://support.law.cornell.edu/students>), Course Registration link, *Request for Credit for Outside Course*. A student electing a course outside the Law School for credit or otherwise, must also register for at least 9 credit hours in the Law School each term. Regardless of the number of courses elected outside the Law School, a student must earn 72 semester credit hours in professional law subjects. This applies to all law students, including those in joint degree programs.

- Exams and dictionaries - JD students** whose native or working language is not normally English may request the use of a non-legal dictionary for examinations by submitting a written request to the Dean of Students by **Wednesday, April 8, 2009**. **JD students who have previously received permission to use a non-legal dictionary previously do not need to make another request.** The non-legal dictionary must be supplied by the student and the dictionary may be in print or electronic format; provided, however, that any electronic dictionary must be a stand-alone dictionary with a set memory (e.g., a dictionary program that is loaded on a laptop computer does not qualify). All electronic dictionaries must be approved by the Registrar well in advance of the examinations.

Professor **Katherine Stone** is a leading expert in labor and employment law in the United States. She was awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship Award in 2008 and a Russell Sage Fellowship for 2008-2009 for her work on the changing nature of employment and the regulatory implications. Since 2004, Professor Stone has been a member of the faculty of the UCLA School of Law.

Previously, she was Professor of Law at Cornell Law School and Anne Evans Estabrook Professor of Dispute Resolution at Cornell School of Industrial and Labor Relations. Professor Stone's recent book, *From Widgets to Digits: Employment Regulation for the Changing Workplace* (Cambridge University Press in 2004) won the 2005 Michael Harrington Award from the American Political Science Association for the “outstanding book that best links scholarship to struggles for justice in the real world.” The book was also the Finalist for the 2005 C. Wright Mills Award from the Society for the Study of Social Problems.

Her latest book, *Rethinking Comparative Labor Law: Bridging the Past and the Future* (with Benjamin Aaron, eds.), was published in the fall, 2007. Earlier books by Professor Stone include *Arbitration Law* (Foundation Press, 2003) and *Private Justice: Alternative Dispute Resolution and The Law* (Foundation Press, 2000). Her current book, *Globalization and Flexibilization: Remaking Employment Regulation for the 21st Century*, will be published by Yale University Press. Professor Stone's scholarship has been published in the Chicago Law Review, Yale Law Journal, Stanford Law Review, UCLA Law Journal, the Industrial Law Journal, and numerous other journals in the United States and abroad.

Professor Ilhyung Lee’s scholarship addresses the intersection of law, society, and culture in Korea; comparative approaches to individual rights; the impact of culture on the dispute resolution process; and the arbitration method and arbitrator ethics in international dispute resolution.

Professor Lee has taught at Waseda University Faculty of Law, in Tokyo, Japan as a Fulbright Scholar, and also at the Tokyo University of Science, Master of Intellectual Property Program. He teaches cross-cultural dispute resolution as an adjunct faculty member at Pepperdine University School of Law, Straus Institute for Dispute Resolution, and Cornell University School of Industrial and Labor Relations, Scheinman Institute on Conflict Resolution.

A Senior Fellow at the University of Missouri’s Law School’s Center for the Study of Dispute Resolution, Professor Lee is included in the roster of neutrals for the Korean Commercial Arbitration Board, the International Centre for Dispute Resolution and the World Intellectual Property Organization, among others. He is also a member of the Institute for Transnational Arbitration, the London Court of International Arbitration, the United States Council for International Business, and the National Sports Law Institute.
